Why all the Buzz?

Apprenticeships are important because:

- They provide opportunity to Earn AND Learn
- Meet Employers' needs
- Participants can save money while in an apprenticeship
- More than the trades
- Can be positive for non- traditional workers
- Can benefit high school students not wanting to go the traditional education route



Definitions

- Apprenticeships Earn and Learn programs that combine formal learning with paid on-the job training as a hired employee.
 - Registered apprenticeship These programs are "registered with the US Department of Labor and have specific requirements about hours, pay, and training through USDOL.
 - Non-registered apprenticeship An apprenticeship with more flexibility such as hours, pay, and training as it is no registered with the USDOL, but developed at a local, regional, or state level.
- Pre-apprenticeships Programs that prepare individuals to enter into specific apprenticeships, registered or non-registered.

5 Hallmarks of Quality Apprenticeship Programs

- Paid, work-based component
- On-the-Job Training (OJT) and mentorship
- Educational and instructional component
- Industry-recognized credentials earned
- Safety, supervision, and equal employment opportunity

AEL: Focus on Workbased learning

- Work-based learning (WBL) provides more opportunities for workers to earn income while gaining critical job skills.
- Apprenticeship and work-based learning in Illinois (report mandated by Public Act 101-364)
 - expanding apprenticeship activities geographically
 - grow the approach into many new industries
 - increase their gender and racial diversity
 - approach to promoting, organizing, and tracking apprenticeship in Illinois should be more formalized in the workforce development system.
 - disruptions caused by the coronavirus pandemic provide an opportunity for innovation.
 - support the growth of apprenticeship and workbased learning.
